For English 9, they will be taking a test on "Romeo and Juliet" and will get the whole class period to work on it.






Delta Girls' Soccer captain Ayren Rapp contesting for possession of the ball - Sebastian Romero

Armando Rodriguez, a freshman, is not planning on taking any art classes, but his favorite project was string painting. He doesn't recommend any of his friends to take any art classes.







CLARKSBURG, Calif. - Are you ready to get soaked? On May 17, Delta High School will be having its last and most wet rally to send students off into summer break with a splash.


But this rally was no easy task to bring about, but a great task that required thoughtful planning, good teamwork and a lot of hard work. And who else but Leadership and its students?

Bringing about a rally like this requires a lot of planning, and according to Alfaro, Leadership has been planning for this "since the beginning of the school year...but [they] actually started planning the games and everything two or three weeks before the [water] rally."

"When we do other rallies we go to the gym, we ball out, finding things to do," said Carlos Ballina regarding the "in this rally we're actually deep planning."

Jennifer Ledesma said, "We've been planning it since



our last rally, we've been talking about it, we've been collaborating, but [on May 6] we finalized every game and every spirit day."

Coming up with games is it's own challenge, as the need to be "safe games we can all play but that we can also enjoy," said Alfaro.

To decide what games will be held at the rally, Leadership "[came] together as a group and ... [had] a vote on how many ... and what games will be played," said Rubio.

However, deciding what games are going to be played at the rally isn't easy. "Sometimes we can't really decide which games are the best," said J.P. Fernandez, a student in leadership, "because sometimes not enough people vote for them."

Then, because of the Water Rally's special nature, leadership also had to take into consideration the rally's outdoor and wet setting. "We can't practice it as much just because of the nature of it," said Halligan.

"I would've probably started sooner," said Alfaro. "I don't think we need to change anything. I think we need to stay on top of it right now," said Rubio.

Regarding the games, Halligan, in an email with the Delta Vine, said the games are going to be kept a secret until the water rally, however, Halligan did say that a soap covered tarp will be involved.

The water rally will happen on May 17 and will be a joint rally between Delta High School students and Clarksburg Middle School students.




